

An Inspiring Story of Courage

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What will it take to survive the next couple of years and to fix our country? A lot of people with a lot of courage. If you're trying to get up enough courage to start a Make Americans Free Again group or to withdraw your children from school, or to tell someone what you really think about what's going on, this story should inspire you!

Helmuth Hübener is one of the bravest persons who lived in Nazi Germany that you have most likely never heard about. He was a devoted member of the Boy Scouts before the Nazis banned the group in 1935 and he was forced to join the youth arm of the Nazi party. In 1938, when he was only 13 years old, he quit the Hitler Youth after the group participated in the Kristallnacht, a night of terror during which Nazis destroyed synagogues, set fire to Jewish businesses, and attacked Jewish people.

Hübener was a Mormon, and watched with horror as the leader of his church joined the Nazi Party and the congregation became increasingly supportive of the Third Reich. Unfortunately, many Mormon churches in Germany and other occupied countries made the same decision due to fear of persecution from the Nazis.

Events of the day upset Hübener greatly and he started questioning the Nazis' hatred of Jews and the Third Reich's growing control of German society.

One of the most important tools for spreading Nazi propaganda was control of the media, particularly radio. The Germans reported that the attack on Pearl Harbor had destroyed the United States' ability to fight a war in Europe, and that Germany was winning the war in Russia.

When Hübener was only 16 years old, he overheard a broadcast on his brother's secret shortwave radio that told an entirely different picture – that the Nazis were racists who hated Jews and targeted them for persecution and that Germany was losing the war.

Hübener made a very risky – and brave - decision. He continued to listen to the illegal broadcasts, and he decided to inform people who did not have access to non-government radio. With the help of three friends, he wrote, printed, and distributed pamphlets that reported truthful information, and called on Germans to resist Hitler. They placed pamphlets in coat pockets, left them in phone booths, and pinned them to bulletin boards.

On February 5, 1942, Hübener was arrested by the Gestapo while working at his job in Hamburg. He had been turned in by a co-worker who figured out what he was doing.

On August 11, 1942 when Hübener was only 17 years old, he was tried as an adult in Berlin, found guilty of treason, and sentenced to death. After the sentence was read, Hübener said to the judges: "Now I must die, even though I have committed no crime. So now it's my turn, but your turn will come."

Hübener's lawyers, his mother, and the Berlin Gestapo appealed for clemency in his case, hoping to have his sentence commuted to life imprisonment, but on October 27 1942, at 8:13PM, he was beheaded by guillotine in Berlin. His two friends, who had also been arrested, were sentenced to five and ten years respectively.

As a teenager, Hübener displayed more maturity and bravery than many adults – both in Nazi Germany at the time, and during the last three years of the COVID debacle.
